Wowbrary is a free service that informs library customers about the library's newest books, CDs and DVDs. The newsletter is sent out weekly to subscribers via email or RSS feeds.

Each issue of Wowbrary features Top Picks as well as the newest titles grouped under a variety of categories: Biographies and Memoirs; Business and Investing; Computers and the Internet; Audiobooks & Courses; Cooking, Food & Wine; Travel; Sports; Health; Religion and Spirituality; Literature & Fiction; Mysteries & Thrillers: Science Fiction and Fantasy: and many more. There are also separate sections for Children's Books, Teen titles, and Comics & Graphic Novels. Select a category of interest to view a list of titles. For each title, you can click on More Info or Reviews to link to Amazon for more details. If you decide you are interested in a title, clicking on Borrow will take you to the FCPL catalog, where you can place a hold.

The titles on Wowbrary are truly the newest of the new. They have just been ordered by the library system.

Wowbrary was created by Interactive Sciences, Inc., a nonprofit corporation that uses technology to better connect people with public library resources.

To receive Wowbrary, go to the library's website at <a href="https://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/library">www.fairfaxcounty.gov/library</a>. Scroll down to the blue Wowbrary seal/logo on the right-hand side of the page. Click on it to go to the Wowbrary site and follow the directions. It's very easy and a wonderful way to get an early alert on items ordered by FCPL. Your email address and information on titles you reserve and check out is not provided to others.

# CRESTWOOD ELEMENTARY TIM KASIK, PRINCIPAL

As we begin 2011, I like to look back at some of what has been happening at Crestwood since the school year began. We have enjoyed active parent participation at school events and are continuing to build strong partnerships throughout the community. The Richard Byrd Library has been active with their support of Crestwood through donating books and sharing with our families some of the December programs that were available at our November PTA meeting. Many of our families and students use the public library and it has been important for me to strengthen our partnership.

One of the challenges we face is getting our students to and from school safely. Most of the children at Crestwood either walk to school or they are dropped off through our Kiss and Ride line. As members of our community, it is our collective responsibility to maintain everyone's safety. Our Kiss and Ride line seems to get longer every day. Our staff has been doing a fantastic job getting our students loaded quickly and safely in an effort to ease the traffic on Hanover. We are also exploring a Safe Routes To School Grant that is intended to raise awareness in the community about the number of walkers we have and to be aware that children are crossing busy streets. The children at Crestwood generally do a great job getting to and from school safely. It is important to remember that they are

children and not always aware of their surroundings. Please keep an eye out as you drive through the neighborhood as we continue to monitor that all students remain safe during their walk to and from school.

We believe that all children learn when provided a safe, nurturing environment. We appreciate all of the continued support the Crestwood community gives to our school.

#### A Message From Supervisor McKay

The end of the calendar year always arrives in a rush with seemingly only a few days between Halloween and the New Year. It's a time to review some accomplishments of the previous months and plan for those of the year to come. Space precludes more than an outline, so please contact my office or subscribe to my e-newsletter at Leedist@fairfaxcounty.gov if you would like more details.

• County Budget: Both a better economic climate and the work we've done over the past several years to maintain core services and trim the non-essential are showing fruit. While we have a projected \$54 million dollar shortfall for FY 2012, that's far better than last year's \$300 million shortfall and FY2009's \$650 million one. My citizen budget committee will continue to provide valuable input and I'd also welcome your thoughts on budget priorities.

- Transportation: A new right turn lane from eastbound South Kings Highway to Harrison Lane and a left turn lane from westbound South Kings Highway to Harrison Lane have improved the traffic flow at the intersection.
- The Board of Supervisors has approved a plan that I pushed for to widen Telegraph Road to four lanes from South Van Dorn Street to South Kings Highway and add turn lanes to unclog South Van Street and South Kings Highway at Telegraph Road. Construction is scheduled for 2013.
- The missing piece of the Fairfax County Parkway is finally in place.
   We've opened both north and southbound lanes of Fullerton Road at its grade separated interchange with the Fairfax County Parkway.

### Removal of Blighted Buildings

The blighted buildings that dotted Old Keene Mill road in Springfield are finally gone! In March, Fairfax County acquired the former Circuit City site on Old Keene Mill Road, demolished the blighted building and built a commuter parking lot that opened on December 6. The site will remain available for the longtime informal slugging operation.

April saw the demolition of the Chi-Chi's restaurant, vacant since 2002. A hotel similar to the nearby Marriott Residence Inn is expected to be built on the site. The adjacent former Shoney's has also been demolished and Long John Silver is not far behind.

### Zoning

The new Department of Code Compliance consolidates the different entities (including the Strike Team) that previously investigated most neighborhood quality of life complaints including boarding houses (overcrowding), parking in the grass, junk in the yard, unmowed grass, graffiti, and building without permits. Violations that fall under different sections of the County's code are now worked simultaneously.
