The policeman said this is not an uncommon occurrence. He did promise to drop by the address, Southampton Drive (near Rolling and Braddock Roads) and see what he might turn up (e.g., folks leaving). The neighbors kept the trash.

Happy Ending in Kidnapping/Car Theft

A kidnapping and car theft incident took place in the 7500 block of Murillo Street on Sunday, October 23 around 4 pm.

A 2006 Honda Pilot left with its engine running and a sleeping two-year-old boy in the back seat, was stolen while his mother briefly stepped inside a home. As she returned to the car, she saw it being driven down the street. Neighbors and police found the car and the unharmed child abandoned nearby at the intersection of Backlick Road and Leesville Boulevard within minutes of the report.

The suspect is described as a white male wearing a dark hooded sweatshirt.

Bank Robbery in Springfield

Police are investigating a bank robbery that occurred Tuesday, Sept. 27. Around 12:05 pm a man entered the Suntrust Bank located at 7205 Commerce Street. The suspect passed a note to the teller demanding money, however the suspect fled without receiving any cash. There were no injuries.


The suspect is described as black, in his 40s, around 6 feet tall and wearing black clothing.

UPDATE: Arrest made in Abduction/Assault

In the last issue of the *Springfield Reporter*, we reported that a 5-year-old girl was abducted from her home in the 7000 block of Brocton Court and assaulted on Aug. 27.

A 16-year-old Springfield area male has been arrested in this case and charged with burglary with intent to commit a felony, abduction with the intent to defile, aggravated malicious wounding and object sexual penetration. The 16-year-old is being held on a detention order at the Fairfax County Juvenile Detention Center.

The 16-year-old had been previously arrested on Aug. 31 for a burglary committed on Aug. 24 in the 5800 block of Accomac Street.

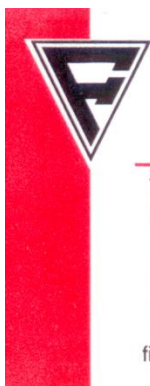
Commuter Lot Thefts

On Thursday, Sept. 22 between the hours of 7 am and 5 pm several vehicles had their catalytic converters removed. All the vehicles were parked at the commuter lot in the 7000 block of Old Keene Mill Road. This commuter lot is co-located with Bob's Slug-line. There were no injuries and no suspect information.

Police Launch Online Financial Crime Reporting

Phony checks, embezzlement, skimmed credit cards and identity theft are among the fastest growing and most prevalent crimes in Fairfax County. Since 2009, detectives have investigated over 2,500 cases of ID theft alone. To help streamline these complex financial investigations, detectives and technical staff worked together to create a new Financial Crime Online Reporting

System (FiCOR) for simpler reporting and quicker response rates for victims.

FiCOR went “live” in Sept. and police have received more than 300 reports from residents who’ve been victimized. Lieutenant Bob Blakley, former Financial Crimes Unit supervisor who helped establish the program, isn’t surprised. “This new system increases the efficiency of our financial crime investigations. Victims are already understandably upset and angry when they’ve lost money; they don’t know where to turn; we think this new system will help.” Previously, residents called police and messages were left on a phone line, but due to staffing, holidays and weekends, victims may have perceived delays in response. The new system is much closer to real-time response.

“Our strategic plan calls us to enhance our services and use manpower more effectively and the FiCOR system does this,” Blakley adds.

The system is one-of-a-kind. When detectives researched various online reporting systems, they didn’t find what they wanted, so they built it from scratch. Seasoned detectives and officers, who have investigated these sorts of cases for many years, helped build the educational component of the site. Officers found many people aren’t aware of what constitutes a crime, when police should investigate and what constitutes a civil matter rather than a law enforcement issue. Residents can learn about common fraud scams, construction fraud, credit card/check theft and fraud, and vital prevention steps. The new web feature clarifies these issues for the public; it’s a one-stop shopping area for vital information concerning all aspects of financial crimes.

Streetlight Outages

As it gets dark earlier, streetlights become even more important. Streetlights in Fairfax County are maintained by either Dominion Virginia Power or Northern Virginia Electric Cooperative (NOVEC). The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) operates the streetlights along interstates and at major interchanges.

- Dominion Virginia Power, call 1-888-667-3000, TTY 711. Select option 1.
- NOVEC, report the outage online or call 1-888-335-0500, TTY 711.
- To report a streetlight outage at major interchanges or a traffic light problem, call VDOT at 1-800-FOR-ROAD (1-800-367-7623), TTY 711.

When reporting an outage, you will need to have the location of the pole and the pole number. To assist you in locating the number, a map of streetlights is available at http://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/dpwes/construction/streetlights/light_out.htm.

Supervisor McKay on Deer

Sometimes I think we might as well post signs declaring Lee District a deer salad bar.

Deer are beautiful creatures in the right setting and in sustainable numbers. Unfortunately, we have herds that far surpass the ability of the environment to feed and shelter them. Deer browsing their way through newly planted landscaping are an annoyance and an expense. Deer as a hazard to humans, habitat, and other species are in another category entirely.

In 2009, Virginia ranked 5th in the nation for deer-vehicle collisions with estimates that 1 in every 138 residents would be involved in a deer-vehicle

collision. Only a year earlier, Virginia ranked 8th in the nation for such collisions.

There are health concerns associated with a high deer population. These include tick-borne pathogens such as Lyme disease and Rocky Mountain spotted fever with deer serving as hosts to these ticks. Additionally, deer in Virginia have tested positive for serious wildlife diseases such as Chronic Wasting Disease and Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease.

Walk through any of our parks and you'll see that there is little or no remaining vegetation from the ground up to five feet. Both native plants and the wildlife that depend on those plants have been harmed by this damage to habitat.

Fairfax County has a deer management program and the Park Authority works in cooperation with the County's wildlife biologist to implement it. The most effective, safe, and sustainable deer population controls currently permitted by the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries are archery, managed hunts, and sharpshooting.

This year's archery program in Huntley Meadows Park runs from Sept. 24 through Feb. 11, 2012. During this time, a qualified archery group will work from elevated tree stands located at least 100 feet from park property lines and 50 feet from established park trails. (Parks will be open during these times.)

Qualified archery groups consist of experienced hunters who have demonstrated superior marksmanship. Archery groups are closely monitored by the County's wildlife biologist office, part of Animal Control in the police department.
