#### Richard Byrd Library Update

During the year 2011, the Library offered many new programs for customers of all ages.

For the first time, we were the host for Mystery Night, an after-hours evening program. Participants interacted with ten suspects, gathered clues, and attempted to solve a murder. Our mystery, Crooke's Crossing, was set at a library gala in rural Virginia.

We also offered a program on social media sites. INOVA presented two outreach programs on health topics: one on hip replacement and one on advanced treatments for acid reflux.

In April, Chief Washington Correspondent for the New York Times and author of "The Inheritance", David Sanger, discussed WikiLeaks and what the release meant to the world.

In December, U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services presented a workshop on becoming a naturalized U.S. citizen.

After a two-year hiatus, we resumed booktalking at area elementary schools this spring, promoting books and encouraging children to keep reading over the summer. At Richard Byrd, we had 1,481 children ages birth to age 18 sign up for the Summer Reading Program; 650 turned in a completed reading log and received a coupon

booklet and put up their name on an animal cutout at our signup table. Overall, FCPL had 48,386 starters and 20,842 finishers.

In the fall, library staff introduced a monthly series of evening family storytimes, Bedtime Stories: In the Company of Stars. For preschoolers, we continued to offer a program for 3-5 year-olds, while our former program for ones and twos was divided into two separate storytimes. Fun for Ones (12-23 months) and Time for Twos (24-35 months) present age-appropriate stories and activities for those age groups and are part of Fairfax County Public Library's focus on early literacy.

One of the most exciting developments in 2011 was the increasing demand for ebooks and eaudiobooks. Thanks to the Friends of the Reston Regional Library, the Friends of the Pohick Regional Library, and the Fairfax Library Foundation, our collection continues to grow. Late in the year, Kindle reached an agreement with OverDrive (our main vendor) enabling the downloading of public library ebooks to their devices. During the month of January, various library branches will offer special workshops on downloading e-material. #### **Snow Tips from Vivian Watts**

## If more than 2 inches of snow are predicted

- 1. Fill up your car with gas. Abandoned cars cause huge problems.
- 2. Put a bag of sand or clay kitty litter in your trunk. The weight provides traction to combat skidding and tire spinning. The sand or kitty litter can be put under your tires if you get stuck.
- 3. Park your car(s) in your driveway. It'll save you a lot of shoveling. It allows snowplows to clear a better path, faster.
- 4. If you can't park a car in the driveway, park it on the side of the street that has odd numbered house addresses. Snowplows can clear a better path, faster.
- 5. When you shovel the end of your driveway, throw the snow to the right as you face the road and snowplows will be less apt to undo your work.

#### What you should expect

- Before the snow gets 2 inches deep, trucks may spread chemicals on major roads to prevent icy pavements. Chemicals may also be spread on feeder roads where there are "hotspots" (difficult slopes / grades) that VDOT has identified.
- 2. Trucks will not start plowing until 2 inches has accumulated, but you may see them parked at their assigned area ready to go.
- 3. Only one 8-foot lane is cleared on subdivision streets. Snowplows will not clear to bare pavement.
- 4. High volume highways are cleared first, but small trucks that can't handle major highways will start clearing feeder roads and then go into subdivision side streets.

#### **Background**

Most equipment and drivers are not VDOT employees. They are private businessmen. When Northern Virginia got 45 inches of snow during February 2010, only about 1700 vehicles were under contract. We now have double that number.

About 1200 of the privately operated vehicles will be equipped with "Automatic Vehicle Locators" to allow VDOT to track where they've been and (continued on page 7)

when. During major storms almost every VDOT staff member (including secretaries) drives assigned areas to look for trouble spots.

You should call 1-800-367-7623 to report problems. You also can email novainfo@vdot.virginia.org and the information will be sent to the closest field office. If you are reporting issues with a snowplow give the approximate time it happened and where.

Finally, you can contact my aide, Deb Sherman, by calling 804-786-1039 during the week or 703-978-2989 on weekends. Send us an email at vwatts@erols.com. Even though we're in Richmond during January and February, we'll do our best to get help to you. Most importantly, many improvements were made to VDOT's procedures based on the 100's of calls and emails we received in 2010.
